	2930	Client is a victim of domestic violence. The housing authority removed her from the two-bedroom waiting list for a unit when her abuser reported that she did not have custody of her children. Once the client was able to demonstrate that both her children were living with her, the housing authority told her she was no longer at the top of the waiting list but had to start at the bottom again. In addition, she is about to have another child. The Center assisted the client in getting back on the appropriate waiting list. Client is now in a three-bedroom unit.
	3372	Client had a stroke in October of 2017 and is now confined to a wheelchair. She currently lives on the second floor of a building that has no elevator. She requested to be transferred to another floor or a different building but the housing provider has not granted her request. The Center assisted the client in requesting a reasonable accommodation of a transfer to a unit that is more accessible to her during the last quarter of the grant. During this quarter, the client was told that she is on the top of the waiting list to transfer to a subsidized unit that is accessible.
	3620	Client is living in a unit that is in very bad condition. The landlord has been notified by HUD that it will not continue subsidizing the property. The client received a housing choice voucher to assist her in moving. Unfortunately, the voucher expires on October 10 and the client is scheduled for surgery on September 14. The Center assisted the client in asking for a reasonable accommodation to extend her voucher an additional 60 days. The client was given until December 7, 2018 to find a new unit with her voucher.

	3067	Client was forced to move when the housing voucher administrator cancelled her housing voucher contract with the landlord for bad conditions. Client was then told her housing voucher was being taken away because she did not find a new unit in the time allotted. The Center assisted the client in appealing the notice that her voucher was terminated because she is disabled which makes it extremely difficult for her to look for new housing. During this quarter of the grant, the housing authority reinstated the client's housing voucher and she was able to move into her new unit.
	3336	Client was told her leave her rental unit because she had a child and the landlord did not want to deal with a child. The Center was able to keep the client in her unit after it explained that discrimination based on familial status is illegal.
	3423	Client applied for state affordable housing for herself, her husband and her children. Her name came up on the waiting list but she was told she did not qualify for housing because of the immigration status of her husband. The Center researched the state regulations on affordable housing and advised the housing authority that the immigration status of a family member is not grounds for disqualification. The housing authority reversed its decision and the client has been accepted.
	3356	Client has a son who is severely autistic. She requested that the housing authority install a lock and a fence around her unit to keep her son from getting out. The Center assisted the client in submitting a request for a reasonable accommodation which was granted.
<i>Shaikh v. RMS Bethel LLC, et al.</i>	CHRO Case No. 1850104	Client and his family that included a wife, three children and his 19-year old nephew tried to rent a house that had 1,967 square feet and was advertised as a two-bedroom. In addition to the two-bedrooms, the house had a room that was called a playroom with its own entrance and closets. The family was denied because the management company said that six people could not rent a two-bedroom apartment. The Center filed a complaint on the client's behalf alleging familial status discrimination. During this quarter of the grant, the Center settled his complaint with the respondents agreeing to pay \$18,500

		in damages and attorneys’ fees, obtaining fair housing training, and not to discriminate in the future.
	3570	Client is in a wheelchair. The ramp up to her unit has been broken for several months and the landlord refuses to fix it. In addition, he raised her rent by \$2,000 because he knew that Section 8 would not pay the rent increase and he wanted to get her out. The landlord also sent the tenant a notice to quit. The Center sent the landlord a letter asking that he fix the ramp and that he take no action to evict the client while she was looking for a new place to live. He fixed the ramp and agreed to take no additional steps to evict the client.
	3504	Client is the mother of twin sons one of whom has autism. Her son’s doctor recommended that the boys have their own rooms. However, when the client presented this letter to the housing authority that administers her housing choice voucher, it refused to give her a three-bedroom voucher. The Center sent a letter requesting a reasonable accommodation of a three-bedroom voucher to the housing authority. The housing authority granted her request.
<i>Smith v. Beacon Residential Management, LP, et al.</i>	CHRO Case No.: 1950018 CHRO Case No.: 19500189 HUD Case No.: 01-18-0284-8	The complainant is a woman with severe breathing issues caused by dust mites and other allergens. Her doctor recommended that all carpeting be removed from her unit. She asked that the carpeting be removed soon after she moved into her current apartment in 2016. The respondents agreed to remove the carpet but never did so despite repeated requests from the complainant. In November 2017, the defendants notified Ms. Smith that in 2015, they had put a hold on any requests for a reasonable accommodation and that while they were again granting reasonable accommodations, they did not know when they would get to her request. In January 2018, the complainant was notified that her lease would not be renewed. Ms. Smith’s lease was terminated in March 2018. After filing the complaint in this case, the respondents agreed to replace the flooring in Ms. Smith’s unit, reinstate her tenancy, and pay her \$26,982.47 in damages and attorneys’ fees. In addition, the respondents will get fair housing training and have agreed not to discriminate in the future.

<i>Colon v. Housing Authority of the City of Hartford</i>	C.A. No.: 3:17-cv-1677 (VAB)	Client is a tenant at Hartford HA. She asked for a transfer to a different apartment because of health problems to her and her autistic child including lead poisoning caused by her current apartment. The housing authority denied her request for a transfer to a unit that did not have lead problems. The housing authority offered Ms. Colon an alternative unit. Unfortunately, that unit was not suitable for her family and was dangerous for her autistic son. After turning down another unit, the housing authority sent Ms. Colon a letter stating the transfer to a new unit would take place whether or not she accepted the transfer and that if she did not move, she would be evicted. The Center filed a complaint in federal court seeking an injunction to prevent the housing authority from evicting Ms. Colon or forcibly transferring her to another unit. During this quarter of the grant, the housing authority agreed to pay Ms. Colon \$51,500 in damages and attorneys' fees. In addition, Ms. Colon is now living in a unit that is lead free and is suitable for her and her children.
	3601	Client is physically disabled and is required to move out of her current unit. Because her unit was condemned, she has received a housing choice voucher and payment for moving expenses. The housing authority required the client to go into its offices whenever she needed money to pay an application fee or to receive documents related to her housing voucher. The Center requested that the client be permitted to receive her housing voucher documents and moving payments by mail. The housing authority granted the request for a reasonable accommodation.

	the client called the police when the landlord was screaming at the client’s daughter. The landlord is threatening to evict him for not being a U.S. citizen. Advised client on his fair housing rights and his landlord tenant rights. Assisted the client in negotiating a new lease.
3472	Client does not speak English. His wife has been hospitalized with a mental illness. As a result both client and his wife have not had any income. They applied for subsidized housing but were told their income was too high. Assisted the client in applying for public housing with current income.
3423	Client was denied public housing after being on the waiting list for 5 years. She believes it is because her husband was not born in the U.S. The Center investigated the client’s complaint and found that she had been denied public housing for reasons other than the immigration status of her husband.
3578	Client called because she was denied subsidized housing. She believes it is because of her immigration status. Investigation did not turn up evidence of national origin discrimination.
3471	Client is Arabic and does not speak English. She believes she is being evicted because of her national origin. Our investigation did not turn up evidence of national original discrimination.
